School improvement teams meet regularly to discuss, assess, and modify the plan as needed. The school improvement teams are composed of the principal, dean of students, counselors, director of curriculum, instruction, and assessment, and various teachers. In addition, parents provide feedback through the use of surveys, and there are also a pair of parents who serve on our school improvement teams.

Communication is sent home in Spanish and our EL teacher translates documents and makes regular calls and visits to our Hispanic families. We have an extensive EL program that includes one-to-one support as well as small group work from certified staff.
